Plea bargains are a significant tool in the criminal process and they should be accepted unless a question arises as to the Defendant's ability to understand and comprehend the significance of the bargained for sentence. Another area of concern with plea bargains may arise in cases involving victims. In those cases, the bargained for pleas should be accepted when the victim is in agreement. If the victim is not in agreement, the plea should be accepted if it is legally appropriate under the sentencing guidelines.

Ensure the level of productivity of judges and staff are such that time and money spent resolving cases is reduced while also ensuring that each case is given appropriate attention.
